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
A note from Mimi Garrard '58, 2019 Distinguished Alumna Award recipient

When told she would be receiving the Distinguished Alumna Award recognizing her achievements in her career in modern dance, Mimi wrote a letter to the Sweet Briar community. She was not able to accept the award at Reunion, but wanted to share her gratitude with alumnae and friends of the College. Her letter follows below.

I am deeply grateful for the Distinguished Alumnae Award. However, I regret I am not able to travel to Sweet Briar because of the health of my husband who is in the late stages of Parkinson's disease.

I owe my best friends, my career, and my husband to Sweet Briar College. My dearest friends are Alice Gaskell '59, Susan Dean, Judith Bell and Teeny Bell '58, and Mary Gearhart '78. Lew Thomas (at SBC in 1957), a former dancer with Mary Wigman, introduced me to modern dance and arranged a scholarship for me to study one summer with Alwin Nikolais. That summer changed my life. The integration of mind, body, and spirit in dance was exhilarating. Choreography and improvisation were fascinating and I was hooked. I moved to New York City after graduation and began studying with Nikolais and his colleagues at the Henry Street Playhouse full time. I later joined his company and he produced my concerts at the Playhouse for ten years. My friend Alice Gaskell kept talking to me about James Seawright who was a friend of her brother. James was from my home town but I had lost touch with him. However, I decided to get in touch and soon we were dating. All important aspects of my life today started at Sweet Briar College.

After my company began touring in the 1970s, Sweet Briar invited The Mimi Garrard Dance Company to perform in their lovely theater on several occasions and I began hosting a workshop in our loft in Soho for Sweet Briar College dance students. Mary Gearhart '78 attended and she began working for me after she graduated. She was my company manager, stage manager, lighting

and graphics designer, and company supporter for many years. Sarah Skaggs attended one of our workshops in our New York City Loft. She was a very talented student who became an outstanding dancer, choreographer and teacher. I am very proud of her achievement. Mark and Ella Magruder who head the dance program at SBC danced with my company for a short but fruitful while.

What I remember most about SBC in a more academic way, was the chance to think. My friends and I had endless discussions about the nature of reality, who we are, and what is the meaning of life.

In closing, I would like to stress the importance of the arts as part of an academic curriculum. Science needs creativity and at its highest level it is as much an art as a science. We need jobs today, but we also need to find jobs that suit our talents and our interests.

Sweet Briar College announces exceptional fundraising results, raising \$18.5 million in fiscal year 2019



During fiscal year 2019, Sweet Briar College received gifts and pledges totaling \$18.5 million. This includes generous donations from alumnae and friends of the College, foundations and corporations. Of that total, \$10.2 million was for fiscal year 2019 and \$8.3 million will come as future support. Since 2015, the College has raised \$63.9 million.

"Sweet Briar has had a spectacular year that opened with recognition by U.S. News & World Report that we are among the most innovative schools in the country," said President Meredith Woo. "S&P Global Ratings has also upgraded the rating for bonds issued for Sweet Briar College for three years in a row. Our success is owed to the support of our alumnae and friends. I'm humbled by their passion and generosity and we at Sweet Briar are singularly committed to being worthy of their support."

Donations impact every aspect of College life. This year, alumnae and friends provided funding for scholarships and travel for prospective students, both of which help the College recruit and retain the best students. Donations supported the College's Grants for Engaged Learning, which enable students to do in-depth research, travel abroad and participate in other hands-on learning experiences. Gifts have also helped Sweet Briar develop agricultural enterprises, rededicating itself to traditional strengths. In addition, donations enable the College to bring well-known speakers to campus. In 2018-2019, Sweet Briar welcomed writer Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie, artist and activist Morehshin Allahyari, Bettina Ring, Secretary of Agriculture and Natural Resources for the Commonwealth and Jim Hubbard, the undersecretary for natural resources and natural resources at the United States Department of Agriculture, among others.

Sweet Briar is grateful for the extraordinary support as we enter the second year of the new academic vision and repositioning of the College by educating the next generation of leaders in America.

Increased alumnae participation: Giving makes a greater impact than you think!

For class leaders and staff members alike, alumnae participation is one of those things that is greater than the sum of its parts. On the surface, it's black and white, a simple calculation that gives us a number. Dig a little deeper, and it becomes a formula that represents more than just giving.

Let's start with the technical components. To calculate participation, we use the total number of solicitable alumnae as our denominator. "Solicitable" means that an alumna has not asked the College to take her off of mailing lists or solicitation lists, and that Sweet Briar has at least one type of contact information on file for her (address, phone, or email).

The numerator is the total number of alumnae donors. When calculating class participation, the same calculation is used, just on a smaller scale: the total number of donors in that class divided by the total number of solicitable alumnae in that class.

Now, for the "greater impact" bit: Alumnae participation is used by U.S. News and World Report as one of seven factors in ranking colleges and universities. So, the higher our alumnae participation rate is, the higher our ranking will be each year. In addition, many granting agencies that fund colleges and universities use alumni participation as a factor in considering potential grants.

In short, increasing alumnae participation rates at Sweet Briar will make us more appealing to prospective students and their families as well as to potential grantors.

Nationwide, colleges and universities are experiencing a decline in their alumni participation rates. While Sweet Briar experienced a boost in the 2015 and 2016 fiscal years thanks to the efforts to save the College, participation in the 2019 fiscal year was 21.5%, lower than the three previous fiscal years.

For the 2020 fiscal year, Sweet Briar seeks to reach an alumnae participation rate of 30%, close to the same number of alumnae supporters in the 2016 fiscal year. Working with the Class Leaders Working Group of the Alumnae Alliance Council and teams of class leaders from all of the living classes, we will rally alumnae to demonstrate what sets Sweet Briar apart from the rest!
