Planned Giving: You can make the difference with a tax-smart Charitable IRA Rollover Gift

An easy way to make a tax-free gift through your IRA, the Charitable IRA Rollover Gift can be made in any month of the year. A donor who is 70 and a half or older and who has an IRA can give up to \$100,000 dollars annually with the equivalent of a 100% income tax charitable contribution deduction.

You can double your tax-smart gift if you and your spouse each make a Charitable IRA Rollover Gift. For example, if Susan and Robert Smith have separate IRA's and both of them are 70 and a half or older, each of them can make a Charitable IRA Rollover Gift of \$100,000 in 2016 for a total gift of \$200,000.

The gift also reduces the amount that a donor must take into taxable income as an IRA minimum distribution. A donor who is required to take a 5% minimum distribution from her or his IRA can instead direct the minimum distribution to Sweet Briar College and reduce his or her taxable income.



Dr. Linda Fink, Dorys McConnell Duberg Professor of Ecology at Sweet Briar and director of the College's environmental science program, has been awarded The Thomas Jefferson Medal for Oustanding Contributions to Natural Science Education. Dr. Fink will receive the award at a ceremony this coming March. The award is presented annually to "a Virginia educator who has made significant contributions to natural science education." Committed to Sweet Briar College for 25 years, Dr. Fink is known for bringing her passion for and vast knowledge of her subject to her classroom, which frequently occurs on Sweet Briar's landscape itself. Dr. Fink incorporates her work with species that live on the College's 3,250 acres—such as the spotted salamanders that live in Guion pond—into her classes, bringing her excitement about them to her students.

In its release about the award, the Virginia Museum of Natural History said it is is recognizing Dr. Fink for her Sweet Briar st career at Sweet Briar, "where she has dedicated her time inspring her students with creative and original teaching perspectives that instill curiosity and appreciation for the natural world."

Lincoln Brower receives award from Center for Biological Diversity

On Friday, December 2, the Center for Biological Diversity presented its fourth annual E.O. Wilson Award for Outstanding Science in Biodiversity Conservation to Lincoln Brower, research professor at Sweet Briar, in recognition of his career protecting and studying monarch butterflies.

According to the Center's release, the award is presented annually to a scientist who has made an outstanding contribution to conservation. The award is named after Edward O. Wilson of Harvard University, whose career has focused on promoting biodiversity and preservation. Dr. Brower's award is a sculpture of an ant in recognition of Wilson's study and expertise on ants and also included a cash prize.

"Thanks to Dr. Brower's remarkable body of research, we not only have a deeper understanding of the monarch's magical annual journey across North America, but a much better shot at safeguarding it for future generations," Wilson said.

Two representatives from the Center for Biological Diversity made the trip to Sweet Briar to present Dr. Brower with his award. Tierra Curry, the Center's anthropocene defaunation prevention specialist, was overcome with gratitude for Dr. Brower as a researcher and activist. She told the story of working with him on the petition to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service seeking Endangered Species Act protection for monarch butterflies, and what a bold step it was for Dr. Brower to sign the petition.

During the presentation, Dr. Brower conveyed his gratitude to the Center for Biological Diversity, to his wife, Linda Fink, and to the Sweet Briar community. Congratulions, Dr. Brower!
